The reasons are well known. I would like to thank the Spanish and Greek sections for agreeing to postpone the organisation of the congress by one year once more, to 2022 for Spain and 2023 for Greece. On the other hand, our video conference will still allow us to move forward with some projects and to all of us together deal with various motions submitted by the International Executive Board and IPA sections.

This renewed postponement of the World Congress should not, however, obscure the fact that the life of our association, as known before Covid, is slowly restarting. Many sections have been able to organise, or will soon be able to organise, their national congresses, their elections, etc. This is encouraging, and we all hope that these first signs of activity will no longer be slowed down by restrictive measures, but will instead mark the return to normal life soon.



Don't we have to admit that the current health situation still only gives us a variant of freedom, or a variant without freedom? We had been promised that the state of emergency, momentarily giving up our rights, obeying the most intrusive orders, letting ourselves be put under guardianship would give us back Freedom. Is that really true? Will it take 3, 4 or 5 vaccinations to give it back to us? It's hard to say.

So even though I welcome the fact that IPA activities are restarting, and the situation is so much better, because the DNA of our association depends on it, I still have the feeling that it will take more for the heart to be really in it as well, and for the clouds of today's situation to stop blurring the blue sky of common sense and freedom.

But one thing is certain, I will never consider wearing a mask as 'the new normal'.

IPA Women from the Baltics head to the Kingdom of Bahrain

Starting with an international symposium entitled "Resolution 1325 Women's Peace and Security" that took place in March 2017 at the Baltic Sea on the ferry "Tallinn-Helsinki-Stockholm", and continuing with the international Symposium "Women from World over", which took place in March 2019 at the Hilton Tallinn Park Hotel in Estonia, this year (2021) IPA Estonia, in conjunction with other partners organised the international conference "Women in Leadership Creating a Better Future Together", which took place from 25-29 August 2021 in a beautiful country – the Kingdom of Bahrain.

The aim of this conference was to inspire and learn from each other, to meet women from different cultures, countries, level of gender equality and women's empowerment; to connect and be connected. It was also a good chance to build up new businesses together.



Four IPA women from the Baltics took part in the conference:

- Maret Tamra from Estonia (the founder of the conference),
- Laura Zaleskienė from Lithuania (one of the conference speakers),
- as well as Ilze Ungure and Indra Luse from Latvia.

For all of us, it was a chance to connect and raise awareness, as well as gain more information about each other.

Most importantly, it was an opportunity for us to present the International Police Association to the conference, and to talk about the Police's actions against domestic violence. We were also keen to share a vital message - that we must cherish each other.

After the conference we took part in workshops in different ministries and institutions.



The IPA Baltic women had the honour of visiting the General Directorate of Women Police under the Ministry of the Interior of the Kingdom of Bahrain, where we were welcomed by Director-General Mona Abdulraheem.

We listened to Bahraini women's history in police forces, shared our practice fighting against domestic violence, and talked about the strength of female police officers, as well as their daily lives at home and at work.

It was a very pleasant talk, and we realised that we were united by the same mission. We hope that in the future, the Kingdom of Bahrain will become a member of our International Police Association family.

A Mountain to Climb: Inspirational news from IPA Ireland

In IPA Ireland, members will be very familiar with the name, 'Annmarie Larkin (Brady)', one of the founding members of our hugely successful IPA Hiking Club. Annmarie was the Honorary Secretary of the club from its inception in 2018 until September 2020, when she handed over the responsibilities of the secretariat to Aoife Reilly. Together with club chairman Danny Devlin, Annmarie was instrumental in developing the club from its humble beginnings, with just a handful of members, to the present day, with a membership of over 220 energetic and dedicated hikers.

In those early day, their enthusiasm attracted members to take part in hikes in regional locations around the country, but soon that wouldn't be enough for Annmarie and Danny and their members, as they embarked on a hugely ambitious schedule of national and international mountain climbs, adding more and more challenges to the club's repertoire.

As a serving member of An Garda Síochána, wife and mother of little Alex, their 6-year-old daughter and busy Secretary of the IPA Hiking Club, Annmarie has always had a very full life and busy daily agenda. While the Covid-19 Pandemic stymied the activities of the IPA Hiking Club somewhat in the early days of summer 2020, there was still a lot of planning going on in relation to upcoming national and international events for club members.

Then in July, Annmarie and her husband Aiden's world was thrown into total chaos when Alex developed swollen wrists and joints, and became more and more

incapacitated. Within six weeks, Alex had gone from being a chirpy six-year-old, full of life and activity, to a little girl who couldn't even walk when 'back to school' time came around. With the usual medical checks being carried out and test result after test result being examined, Alex was admitted to Cavan hospital, awaiting an available bed in Crumlin Children's Hospital. Annmarie speaks very highly of the care and treatment afforded Alex in Cavan hospital and in Crumlin Children's Hospital where she was given her diagnosis of Juvenile Idiopathic Arthritis, a debilitating condition in children under sixteen years of age, causing inflammation in a joint or joints.

Around one child per thousand is affected, with upwards of eighteen hundred children affected in Ireland at any given time. Thankfully, treatment by way of medication can be very effective. but it does require a cocktail of medicines and close monitoring. The effects also cause the autoimmune system to be suppressed. Not something anyone wants in ordinary times and much less so in these days of a Pandemic. Following Alex's stay in Crumlin hospital, she had to cocoon at home for twelve weeks. It's hard to keep a six-year-old down, and so it was with Alex, especially when she began to feel a little better.

Keeping that old adage 'the apple doesn't fall far from the tree' in mind, it is easy to see why Alex wasn't going to let her condition keep her sitting still. Soon she was getting up to speed again and accompanying her mum Annmarie on her work as the Cavan/Monaghan 'Little Blue Heroes' representative. Then, earlier this year, Alex met two 'Little Blue Heroes' locally and immediately told her mum and dad that she wanted to do something to help them.

Following in mum's footsteps, she chose to do a sponsored climb of a mountain, to raise money for Little Blue Heroes, a Garda orientated and supported charity, which provides much-needed assistance to children suffering from chronic long-term illness. It is also supported in its work by IPA Ireland. Annmarie got to work, with Donegal's highest peak in Errigal mountain being chosen, and soon the offers of help from the IPA Hiking Club and Little Blue Heroes came rolling in.

On 29th June, accompanied by her mum Annmarie and dad Aiden, Alex arrived in Donegal to a great welcome. There to greet them were Danny Devlin, Chair of the IPA Hiking Club, joined by IPA Camera Club member, John Cahalin and Gardaí Barbara Doherty, Grainne McLoone and Gerry McCauley (who is also a member of Donegal Mountain Rescue) with his three young daughters. and Donegal native Christine Gallagher of Cavan's Community Engagement Unit, Hugh Gallagher with his sister Ann and her husband Frank completed the welcome party, as they set off to conquer Errigal.

'This was quite a daunting challenge for a six-year-old child, but Alex climbed the whole way and back', said Annmarie. It is easy to tell that Aiden and Annmarie couldn't be prouder of their little daughter, and rightly so. There was a sense of carnival on their return to the car park after their three-and-a-half-hour hike, with Little Blue Heroes, Honorary Sergeant Jack and Honorary Gardaí Rory and Ray and their families waiting for them. Superintendent David Kelly of Milford phoned Alex with a congratulatory call. In the following days, Alex's sponsorship started adding up, amounting to a fantastic €5,750, which was duly given on to the Little Blue Heroes charity by Alex.

Then, a short time afterwards, Alex met with Cavan's Honorary Gardaí, Jessica and Leon, the

two local Little Blue Heroes who had inspired her. It was Alex's wish that some of the funds that she had raised would be used to help Jessica and Leon, and so with the kind assistance of Cavan Roads Policing Unit and the local Community Engagement Units, a visit by them all, with family, to Toy Master Cavan was organised. There, the owner Francis Clarke and his staff Maria, Deborah, Dean and Ian took the Little Blue Heroes under their wings and before long, the Little Blue Heroes had decided on getting electric ride-on jeeps while their siblings were also given a chance to choose a gift. The staff of Toy Master also made a generous donation of €200 to Little Blue Heroes, presenting the cheque to Annmarie Larkin Brady for the charity.

On Friday, 3rd September 2021, the group welcomed the 214 new police recruits who started their journey to become police officers in 2021 in Münster. After the official welcome ceremony of the new recruits, the Chief of Police of Münster, Falk Schnabel, personally welcomed the first international delegation in 2021 at the Police Headquarters.

Die musikalische Umrahmung der Mittagspause wurde von der Musikgruppe "die Pöllys" übernommen.

IPA Brazil support III Brazilian Congress on Women in Police

On 27th and 28th August 2021, the 'III Brazilian Congress on Women in the Police' was held at the Hotel Nord Luxxor, located on Tambaú beach in the city of João Pessoa, in the state of Paraíba/Brazil.



The congress was promoted with the support of the IPA in Brazil, by the Movement of Women Police Officers of Brazil – MMUP, and brought together female police officers from the public security forces throughout Brazil.

During the event, the role of female police officers in the segment of national public security was discussed, as well as the difficulties female police officers face as professionals.

In addition, the congress aimed at implementing new policies to confront the issues of Brazilian policewomen, which led to a draft letter for the improvement of the working conditions of policewomen.

We recall that IPA Brazil was the author of a bill on the special retirement of female police officers in Brazil, which is now a specific law that also came to cement the special retirement of male police officers.

The president of the Movement of Women Police Officers of Brazil – MMUP, the police officer Eline Teixeira Lemos, IPA member and part of the National Executive of the IPA in Brazil stated:

"The Congress that sought to value female police officers in national public security achieved its goal.

It was very good to see several speakers presenting themes related to professional activities, nuances and barriers of women's performance in public security, in



addition to the exchange of experiences between the participants, which resulted in an important draft letter that we are sure will materially improve conditions of women police officers in Brazil".

IPA Deutschland – Nach der Flut Soforthilfe für IPA-Mitglieder, Kolleginnen und Kollegen

Nach den verheerenden Überschwemmungen in mehreren Teilen Deutschlands hat die IPA Deutsche Sektion schnell und unbürokratisch geholfen.

Zwölf IPA-Mitglieder und sechzehn Polizistenfamilien erhielten bislang Soforthilfen in Höhe von 37500 €.

Sobald Gewissheit über Schadenshöhe und Erstattungen besteht, werden weitergehende Hilfen geprüft.

Über 26.000 € wurden von Einzelpersonen und IPA-Organisationen gespendet, die sich darauf verlassen können, dass ihre Spenden unmittelbar den Betroffenen zugutekommen.

Die Deutsche Sektion bedankt sich bei allen IPA-Organisationen, die ihr Mitgefühl ausgedrückt oder sogar finanziell geholfen haben.

Following the devastating floods in several parts of Germany, the German IPA Section helped quickly and unbureaucratically.

Twelve IPA members and sixteen police families so far have received immediate aid totalling 37,500 €.

As soon as firm details regarding the damages and replacements are known, the process of providing further assistance is started.

More than 26,000 € have been donated by individuals and IPA organisations that could rely on the fact that their donations would benefit those affected immediately.

The German Section would like to thank all IPA organisations that have expressed their sympathy or have helped financially.

European Police Congress 2021: IPA represented by Section Germany, the IEB and Gimborn

IEB Involvement



The 24th European Police Congress was held in Berlin, Germany on 14th and 15th September. The congress, as so many others, had been postponed twice due to the pandemic. Consequently, only 1/3 of the normal number of participants and exhibitors made a registration. Still, about 1,200 entered the Berlin Congress Center, BCC on the first morning. The organisers had ensured that the congress would be pandemic-safe; EU Covid certification, face masks and check-in via a Covid-19 app tracker plus

support staff present in every seminar room.

The congress theme was "Europe in crisis mode: Legitimacy - Leadership – Equipment", and the IEB had been invited to represent from an international level. As Secretary General, I participated in the full congress programme which had large panel discussions, panel sessions and breakout seminars on the topic.

The panel discussion which the IPA was invited to join on the first day, examined "Policing during and after the crisis". The impulse to this was given by Prof Dr Wilhelm Schmidbauer, who gave a basic presentation on the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on policing in Germany.

This was followed by a panel discussion with Commissioner Luís Miguel Carrilho, UN Police Advisor, Department of Peacekeeping Operations, Dr Daniela Lesmeister, Head of Police Section, Ministry for Home Affairs North Rhine-Westphalia, May-Britt Ronnebro, IPA Secretary General, and Calum Steel, 1st Vice President, European Confederation of Police, Secretary General, Scottish Police Federation.



Questions including democracy in demonstrations, increase of violence, expectations on police officers in crisis – pandemic or war zones, training, equipment and leadership were touched upon. These topics returned in many panel sessions and seminars during the two days.

Many new contacts were made, and we promoted the professional pillar of the IPA.
